

The recipient of this gift was the UCCP Pasuquin Learning Center in the Philippines that was founded and established by our past WBM president, Alma Balatico, and her husband Gold. Alma shared how joy will shine in the eyes of these children this Christmas when this gift allows the staff to host a Christmas party with one of their favorite treats – ice cream.

HOMELESS BLESSING APRIL 1, 2015

It is more blessed to give than to receive

It was another successful blessing considering the 90°+ weather...even the kids didn't complain and were so focused....People are a lot more open when we bring children. I just asked them what they thought and felt. Kiara said, "We sure helped a lot of people and that feels really good!" Julian the youngest at age 7 said, "I think it's sad! One man was so happy just to get a bottle of cold water!" Haven and Shaden said they felt good that they had helped these people.

He asked if he could have the bible I used to test his vision and he could see! Corinne wrote: "Beautiful Homeless Blessing~ Only my second time helping out distributing food, toiletries, clothes, towels, sheets and the basic necessities that a lot of them don't have. The kids had an experience I'm sure like no other... they were awesome and eager young helpers and they did an outstanding job.... I'm sure this experience taught them a lot! Although such a rich experience it is to help others less fortunate, it's a very sad situation for anyone to be in. The homeless population has tripled since the first time I went... I saw familiar faces which saddens me to know that nothing has changed over the past couple years.... The same two guys that needed glasses the last time, needed glasses again... A man was so grateful for what we gave him, he shared a prayer with us. One thing about these people is that no matter how down and out they are they are grateful and so very appreciative for just a towel.... a bottle of cold water... a beach mat so they don't have to sleep on a piece of cardboard.... I always leave with a sense of gratitude and what it feels like to be truly blessed.... it's the person that gives that is more blessed than the person who receives... like I always say.... "The homeless are no different from you or I just because they don't have a home to live in."









I don't know why I've done this to myself. Drugs! Kaliko later told me at Kakaako people had soda bottles full of urine just outside their tents!

Darleen wrote: "This guy was so amazing, Matthew...He was so excited to get reading glasses to read his bible that we gave him...Just precious....Melinda Ahn's gorgeous daughter and grandchildren helped a lot!" They were so thankful to gather some clothes. Sharing is caring! Loving everyone is a joy and just their smiles and thankfulness gave us back so much! Wonderful day today sharing the love of Jesus at Kapalama Canal, A'ala Park and Kaka'ako Park and getting the children involved so they'll always be thankful for what they have.

Lee Lane-Miller, a supporter of our WBM, and her sons, Ryan and Devon along with Darleen Perry's son, Kalama, helped so much with their younger strong bodies that could walk far and fast. Melinda's niece, Jen Teixeira, and daughter, Kaiya, came with her big SUV that was full of clothing, blankets, towels, beach mats and coolers filled with cold water.

The world of the homeless seems very far from yours, but in some ways it is quite near. For any of us, the loss of a job, the death of a spouse or a child, or a severe physical or mental disability could be the route to total despair. These are the very tragedies that have happened to many of the homeless people we talk with. Struck by personal tragedies, they have lost their homes and been deserted by the families and friends.

What can you do to help them? Sometimes the smallest things can go a long way. One of the first steps in helping people is to see them as individuals and to find out what they need. Notice them. Talk to them. Most are starved for attention. Give the homeless people the same courtesy and respect you would give to your friends, your family, your employer. Treat them as you would wish to be treated if you needed assistance as they do.

We can make quite a difference in the lives of the homeless when we respond to them, rather than ignore or dismiss them. Try a kind word and a smile.

ZOE INTERNATIONAL



We are in the midst of a very busy time. ZOE received a US government grant in the past year (it is a 3-year grant) and we have been working hard to fulfill all the requirements. This grant has allowed us to beef up our security (we have installed lighting, cameras, wrought iron fencing, etc) and expanded our vocational school to help train some of our children who previously never got any opportunity to go to regular school. This program was designed to give them valuable skills so that they can become productive members of society when they are of age to do so. This includes carpentry, masonry, welding, office skills, hospitality and the basics (reading, writing, math) along with English. This supplements our current program that already has a coffee shop, sewing, agriculture and husbandry.

We are also holding a gala event in Los Angeles because we are in the process of launching a transitional house in the Los Angeles area. This is critical because it will give us a presence on the two entry points for human trafficking across international borders. Many trafficking victims are sent across international borders because they have no legal rights in that new country do not speak the language and do not know how to get help. By us having a Thailand and USA presence, we can help rescue and prosecute more international cases. This is a long process in California because there are so many more laws, rules and regulations, but we have been working on this project for several years and we are confident that soon after we raise all the funding, we will be permitted to open a home in the Los Angeles area!

We are also building a new safe home in Thailand on our campus to allow new children who come into our facilities to have a specific area to decompress and get familiar with us before we integrate them into our normal families. Previously, we had these safe homes off site, but we are now building a very secure, state of the art facility to help us create a safer and more healing environment for these new children. This project is in the initial stages, (we have gone through 4 different drafts on the building and making adjustments as we learn from a wide variety of experts, what is the best practices for a facility of this type) but we are confident that once everything is in place we will break ground sometime next year.

This week is family bonding week and the children are off from regular school or vocational school (whichever one they attend) and we have scheduled the entire week for our house parents to bond more with their children. The school schedules for these children are hectic and this week affords them the opportunity to reconnect for longer periods of time with the house parents and the other children in the family. They will do simple things like go fishing, or play board games, go to the park, have special family meals, have times of worship together, watch a DVD movie, etc. It is a wonderful time to just watch our children get to be kids and enjoy the blessings of God!

During Singapore Night, around 54 students showed up to hear Eugene share his journey from rejection following his parents separation to freedom and healing found in his relationship with Christ. Nicole, one of the students from Singapore, met Tiana

and shared the Gospel with her. Later on, Tiana told Nicole that she was on the verge of making a bad decision, but after meeting with Nicole and hearing the Gospel, she had a change of heart Tiana now meet with Annette for follow up Bible study. The fruit of these connections with students continued as the UOG staff and students took over the meetings and follow-up of those interested in knowing more about Christ.

During their two-week mission, the Lord enabled the Guam Hybrid-Philippine team to give 188 Gospel presentations with 102 praying to receive Christ. They also hosted a stress management seminar, weekend evangelism training and led follow-up groups to approximately 21 students at the UOG. These are the results of the prayers and support of valued family, friends and ministry partners. These students in the mission cherished the enthusiasm of the churches in Guam who hosted and gave to the teams.



Take a look at what God is doing on Kaua'i.

<u>Kauai Sacred Day Walk</u>. This was the third year that ReSource for Christian Spirituality offered a Christian formation wilderness experience with one year of follow-up spiritual support to young adults. We are so very grateful for the faithful scholarship support and prayers of the Woman's Board of Missions for the Pacific Islands.

Changes were introduced this year, which enriched the day walk experience. First, for six months prior to the day walk, ReSource hosted Sacred Strolls, which were one-half-day nature experiences to form community and introduce possible applicants to the richness of meeting God in nature. Second, the age range of young adults was expanded to include ages 18-36. Third, relationships with youth ministers were cultivated to expand the pool of applicants from different islands. All of these changes were positive in enrolling seven adults who deepened their relationship with God in Christ and discerned their vocational calling.

Next year ReSource hopes that members of the Woman's Board of Missions for the Pacific Islands will be inspired to consider sponsoring a young adult from their congregation to the 2016 Kauai Sacred Day Walk.

Islandwide Youth Coordinator. The Kauai Association UCC recently entered into a Memo of Agreement with Rev. Rennie Mau to support the position of Islandwide Coordinator for a second year, through June 2016. Thus far, events and activities have drawn 15-30 youth, 6th-12th grade. Giving glory to God, one of the 6th grade youth leaders was named to emcee an islandwide youth rally for more than 200 6th-12th graders.

<u>Lihue United Labor Day Breakfast</u>. Lihue United Church will host its Annual Labor Day Breakfast to benefit its missions. This year proceeds will be designated for the islandwide youth ministry.

<u>Henry Opukaha`ia book.</u> Linda Shigeta has been working with Kauai Museum to carry the Henry Opukaha`ia book in their gift shop.

<u>Kamehameha High School Deputation Team</u>. Forty students from Kamehameha High Deputation Team visited Kauai and conducted worship at Hanapepe Hawaiian Congregational Church recently.

<u>Na Himeni Concert.</u> Hanapepe Hawaiian Congregational Church hosted its annual Na Himeni Concert fundraiser recently to a nearly sell-out crowd. Naomi Yokotake of Wai'oli Hui'ia, Sam Ka'auwai and the Kapaa First Hawaiian Church Choir, and UCC Conference Associate Minister Ken Makuakane offered beautiful music and lots of stories about the composers and circumstances for writing the hymns.

<u>Micro-Enterprise for Marshallese Women</u>. Linda Shigeta has been in conversation with Rev. Dr. Nani Hill to confirm the micro-enterprise start-up for Micronesian women to sew and sell purses in Koloa.

<u>New Position.</u> The Rev. Dr. Phyllis Meighen has been called by Lihue United Church to serve as its interim pastor beginning October 1, 2015.

The Edith H. Wolfe Memorial Fund is for the specific purpose of granting scholarship monies for women studying and/or working in the Pacific Islands. Rev. Wolfe always desired to give support for women who desire to earn degrees so they can build a stronger and more vibrant community.

Through the work of our Edith H. Wolfe Memorial Scholarship Committee (Carolyn Winston, Rebecca Woodland, and Rev. Phyllis Meighen), our WBM granted three \$1000 scholarships for the 2015-2016 fiscal year. These scholarships were awarded to

three women who already serve in ministry in the Philippines. Aiza Aguda and Angelica Fiesta are both working on Early Childhood Development at the Ecumenical Theological Seminary in Bagiuo City. Both of these young women are also graduates of the UCCP Pasuquin Learning Center. The other recipient is Rev. Ligaya San Francisco, a minister serving in a United Church of Christ who is working on her doctorate of ministry to better develop her skills for serving all peoples in her community.

FAMILY THANK OFFERING

For the 2015-2016 fiscal year, and as of November, our Family Thank Offering Committee (Judy Rantala, Grace Murata, Nora Kamikawa) approved six one-time mission grants totaling \$2,575 providing relief for five women and one family who were in crisis and in great need of emergency financial assistance.
